Schism

A formal division or separation

Why has the lower case 'c' catholic church, the universal church as we know it, failed to actually do what we are called to do?

Folks that are in our faith tradition know that we have a book that outlines our history, starting from the beginning, the literal beginning, through the visions of the end times, whenever the second coming will happen. We have the ability to see how history repeats itself over and over again and yet we enjoy being part of the problem. Yes, I said we ENJOY being part of the problem. Someone is reading this and is getting offended. I'm not sorry about that. I have to say and use the word enjoy. If we didn't enjoy it, we would be disgusted by it and would work to be part of the change, not part of the consistency. History repeating itself is because mankind has refused to really learn and to attempt to do things differently. It falls into the definition of Einstein's parable of quantum insanity: "Insanity is doing the same thing over and over and expecting different results."

The Holy Bible, the inspired Word of God, is for us to study, to learn from, and to live out. Here is the problem: Mankind has misused the privilege of having these texts to learn from. Throughout history we see how mankind has decided that ego, power, authority has always taken over how we "practice" our faith tradition. When creation came to be, there were not all of these rules in place by God with how we were supposed to worship Him. The rules that later came into being were man made, the same man made rules that still plague us today.

Man made doctrine has caused a formal division or separation before the word was even used. Our tradition stems from judaic roots. The Old Testament is all about our judaic ancestors! That's right people, everyone's a little bit Jewish. We go from creation of mankind and mankind's first sin to exodus from Eden to weird practices that are not pleasing to God to 316 Judaic law to the coming of the Messiah and shrinking to 2 laws (love the Lord your God and Love your neighbor to the Jesus movement in Judaism to the formation of "the church" to Catholicism to Protestantism to 47,000+ denominations.

The division among believers in our faith tradition comes down to man's interpretation of God's wants on earth. Here is the problem with that: We are creations of God, made in his image, to do his will on earth. We are called by God to live our life according to the teachings of Jesus the Messiah, Yeshua HaMashiach, God incarnate. We are not actually God! Just because we have the ability to read the inspired Word of God doesn't mean we can play God in our actions and reactions within the world.

How many times have you seen, heard, read about different churches that have chosen to split and form a new sect within a denomination due to one singular issue? It is still happening today! The United Methodist Church is facing a split over the topic of the LGBTQ+ community. There has been a new split within the Church of the Brethren around this area because of man's response to one specific topic. Sometimes it isn't just one thing, it is multiple small problems that come to a head and explode. This is a problem! When we, the universal church, allow for man made rules, understandings and practices run how we practice our faith, we already have put God on a back burner. It is because of man's interpretations to topics, practices, rules of rituals, etc, that have caused us to go from being united like our ancestors in the Jesus movement to having so many different sub-groups within the universal church.

Dr. Chris Crain wrote an article about church conflict. Within the article he listed points of conflict: **Pride:** People often behave with self-centeredness, ego, and pride. When you feel that life is about you, you take things personally.

Spiritual and Emotional Immaturity: Maturity helps a person understand that differences in perspective broaden understanding. Mature people learn to disagree without being distressed. Mature people are self-aware and seek to improve their weaknesses. Immature individuals have not learned to avoid disputes over a person's personality or style.

Change and Inflexibility: In reality, change is the norm. When policies or priorities change in the church, misunder-standings and stresses are likely to occur. When pastors and church leaders make strategic decisions, an effective process of communicating these new directives and norms is crucial.

Abuses of Power: Power is the influence a person has on his or her environment, relationships, or self. Shifts in power may create gains or losses. Power is the ability and means to get things done. Conflict expert Dudley Weeks wrote, "People choose how they use power and whether they allow it to be corrupt. We can use power negatively or positively. The severely damaging seesaw power approach creates the illusion that you are more powerful when you make the other party less powerful."

Church Politics: Factions in the church may intentionally or unintentionally engage in political maneuvering and posturing that leads to conflict.

The problem really goes well beyond these on-point thoughts. I have been struggling as a Pastor, Spiritual Caregiver, Disciple, Wife, Mentor, Friend, etc., to figure out why I have been unhappy with my spiritual state. Don't get me wrong, I love my church, I love my job and my calling, I love what I do. Just because I love what I do, I love the folks I serve, and I love the calling I have doesn't mean that something may not be working or may not be effective. I have had an issue for years with the universal church because I have watched the toxicity that is the "organized church" become more and more noticeable and problematic as I have grown older and have studied scripture more and more. The universal church has become primarily a church for churched people only. Yes, there are some churches that really do work to be a church for the unchurched: they are the exception, not the norm. Churches are so focused on the people already inside of their walls they do not have the want, desire, willingness, or drive to actually do what we are called to do.

I stated before that we are called to be disciples of Jesus the Messiah. Jesus did not work within awful and false teachings that were in place by the religious leaders of the time. Jesus was a rebel, going against the common rules, practices, teachings of the temple and its leaders. Jesus went to those that were labeled by the temple leaders and Jewish Religious Police and unclean. He cared for those that were the outcast, that didn't know the Word of God, who may never have been exposed to who God truly was. He sat and dined with the sinners and the tax collectors after healing a man on the Sabbath in the house of a Prominent Pharisee. He knew he was being watched by the Pharisees and Sadducees of the time. He knew it was against their regulations to "work" on the Sabbath. He knew it was against Judaic tradition to eat with the people he chose to eat with. He didn't care. He was doing the work of God, not the work of man who thinks they are God on earth. His ministry was not spent name-calling, demonstrating distaste for different groups, alienating people not like him. His ministry was spent loving people for who they were and where they were as he guided them towards where God wanted them to be.

We all need to wake up and think about what we are doing on this earth. We need to take a look with our own denominations and ask why we feel so threatened by other denominations to the point we do not work together anymore. Why is it that our man made cliques have made it so we are not only divided, we are okay and happy with this being so? I'm tired and I know I am not the only one. I am tired of fighting what feels like a losing battle because mankind can't get over themselves. I'm tired of reading how Christians are all hypocrites and that's because in the big picture it is true!

I am reading a book and so much of what I have been battling on a personal level has been validated in many ways with this book. I am not a reader, it isn't a hobby I enjoy. I want to end this blog with a few thoughts from this book. I challenge you to read these and ask yourself if they apply to you as an individual, if they apply to your local church, and what can we do about it?

(town of residence) needs a church where church people are comfortable bringing their unchurched friends, family members, and neighbors. We need to create a church unchurched people would love to attend."

"Churches designed for saved people are full of hypocrites. You pretty much have to be a hypocrite to participate."

"Churches shouldn't do anything that makes it unnecessarily difficult for people who are turning to God."

"God's love is a "regardless" kind of love."

BRETHREN BITS FROM THE DESK OF BETTY DZUBBA

Recently I was asked to do some historical articles for upcoming issues of the "MEMO." We will begin with a backward look at some of our earliest Brethren settlers and their communities. Again, we continue to be grateful to Dr. Emmert Bittinger for the extensive research in preparing the "Allegheny Passage" our most valuable historical tool which I continue to use for learning and sharing about the history of West Marva's churches.

The Settlement of New Creek started as early as 1752 according to Dr. Emmert Bittinger in Allegheny Passage, which may come as a total surprise to most of you.

Brethren in the New Creek Valley, where today Keyser is found ... and the home of Potomac State College ...really? Indeed yes, several Brethren actually were part of the initial settlers, after the native Americans had used this area as some of their favorite hunting grounds.

The Eckerlin group according to Dr. Bittinger "traversed the New Creek area on their way west to what is now Kingwood in Preston County." The Eckerlin settlement was another old community of Brethren.

Many of you have roots along the South Branch of the Potomac but likely it may come as a surprise that Keyser on the Potomac River is located on the North Branch. The stream New Creek is a tributary of the North Branch. Most people who live and were schooled in Mineral County know the town we call Keyser today, until several years **after** the end of the Civil War, was known during the war years of the 1860's as "New Creek."

When the first settlers came to stake their claims, generally after the late1750's, where we have Keyser as the county seat of Mineral county was untamed wilderness. As families penetrated the thick forested countryside, following Indian trails—the only available "routes" available in this area overrun by game—food in the wilderness that tempted eager pioneers.

Thanks to Dr. Bittinger's untiring research efforts, the name Christopher Beelor* is brought to our attention. The Beeler family lived just east of Winchester, Virginia in a more developed section of the "Virginias." His neighbors included Henry Rinker and Jacob Chrisman and others.

Are you familiar with the Ephrata Cloisters? (That may be a topic for another article!) One of Beelor's daughters and a sister lived in the Ephrata Cloisters. This unusual religious group was well known among early Brethren in Pennsylvania.

Christopher Beelor and his first wife Catherina joined the Ephrata Cloisers before 1740. Beelor acquired land in the Winchester area, and with his good connections he acquired a house in Alexandria, Virginia. By 1750 he was interested in new settlements and tempted to acquire land as his business contemporaries were also excited by the westward expansion.

In 1752 he acquired over three hundred acres on New Creek and built a home on the present site of Keyser. By 1757 the Indian raids and attacks on these scattered settlements in this area occurred frequently. Many of those earliest pioneers left their relatively new log cabins in the Keyser area and fled either back to New Jersey or Pennsylvania.

Historic Fort Ashby is the only fort still standing, of many erected along the frontier. Fort Ashby located in the town of the same name is not far from Keyser or Romney. Actually, there was a blockhouse where pioneers sought shelter near Allegheny Front and not far from the stream we know as New Creek. Nothing remains of the blockhouse.



An update was presented on the revision of the District Executive Minister's job description. As the parsonage has been vacant since the Interim DEM left, the board decided to offer the parsonage portion of the district office for rent. The office continues to be available for use only by the district. A couple different possibilities for renting the parsonage were discussed and are being followed through. The board voted to affirm the withdrawal of two churches, Red Creek (Bethel) and Maple Spring from the denomination and subsequently from the district.

It was reported that both Camp Galilee and Camp Hope removed Church of the Brethren from both their corporations and constitutions. West Marva looks forward to a continued close relationship and support of both camps, but since they are no longer COB camps we are unable to continue doing their background checks.

Ordained Minister - Need CEU's? This message is for you!

One of the biggest questions pastors ask is how they can get CEU's. They know that if they are part-time, they need 2.5 CEU's and if they are full time they need 5. This is a requirement every 5 years. The simple ways to get some CEU's is to attained the District Conference and attend the ethics class that is offered in the district. You get CEU's for the conference once every 5 years. With these two ways, you can obtain a combined 1 CEU. So how do you get the rest?

Simple ways to do this is to read books that relates to things that relates to being a pastor. It can be situations that may happen in the church to building community relations. You can also use professional development classes you may have to do in your everyday job. All you have to do is write a summary of the book, or a summary of the development and how it relates to issues a pastor could face. You can also send in things you have volunteered for such as church camps or other events you may be involved in. If you send these things in the ministerial board will look at it and decide if it counts or not. Another thing that you can do is to take a class that is offered through the reading program.

Looking at doing a free course that can get you 1.5 CEU's? Go to world-outreach.com/web/lea-sol and look at the school of leadership program. This is an absolutely free program. There are seven series that have several lessons in each series. To watch all of the videos in the seven series it takes about 12 hours. After watching these video's you just need to write a summary about each series. Seven summaries in all. The best part about this program is it is absolutely free.

These are just some examples that you can do to earn CEU's. Should you want to take advantage of these opportunities, once you write the summaries you can send them to jellifritz@k12.wv.us.
